I have been honored to serve as ISVMA President throughout the past year. During my presidency, the focus of the ISVMA Board of Directors and staff has been on essentially four things:



- 1. Expansion of member benefits.
- 2. Review and update our governing documents.
- 3. Regain a healthy financial position for the association.
- 4. Reach 2000 veterinarian members by July 1, 2007.

ISVMA has made significant progress toward each of these goals during 2004. There is one goal, however, in which we need to support and participation of our members. The Board established a goal of reaching 2000 members by July 1, 2007. We're excited that 303 veterinarians have joined ISVMA in the past year! However, we're still 400 veterinarians short of our goal. The thermometer on page keeps track of our progress in reaching the membership milestone. We include the thermometer in every issue of the Epitome to remind you that we need the support of members to help reach our membership goal.

Do you have an associate that isn't a member of ISVMA? Is there another practice in your area that hasn't been convinced of the importance of the membership investment? Please share a copy of the Epitome with these prospects. Ask them to visit the ISVMA website or give the staff a call to ask for a membership application.

There are approximately 12 million people in the State of Illinois and groups of them have, at times, joined in an attempt to set the policy agenda for our profession. There are only 2700 licensed, practicing veterinarians in the State and we must rely upon each other, collectively and individually, to uphold the strong principles of veterinary medicine and protect the animals, public and environment that we serve. Our strength comes from the participation of veterinarians in their state association. The collective voice of 2700 veterinarians would have a profound influence on future policy decisions at the state level and would benefit the profession more than any program or service the Board and staff can develop.

THE VETERINARIAN'S ROLE IN PUBLIC POLICY

I began my professional career as a policy analyst for the Illinois House of

Representatives and also spent 15 years as a lobbyist. I learned through that experience that legislators value the information they receive from experts and practitioners. The legislature is well represented by lawyers, farmers, smallbusinessmen, teachers and other professionals. Not one of them, however, is a veterinarian or an expert in veterinary medicine. Legislators depend upon facts and data to make good decisions. When they make bad decisions, it is often the result of either poor or a complete lack of information.

Veterinarians are uniquely qualified to provide information, service and advocacy on important public policy issues including animal welfare, animal health, food-safety, public safety from zoonotic diseases and bioterrorism security. The expertise of the state's 2700 licensed and practicing veterinarians is critical in the development of effective public policy. ISVMA gives veterinarians a voice to assert their influence.

The absence of veterinary expertise on the floor of the Illinois Senate and House of Representatives creates an information vacuum that should be filled by veterinarians. If the veterinarians of Illinois don't offer an opinion on issues of importance to their profession, somebody else will.

Only 18 months ago, a group of well-funded and motivated non-veterinarians were able to hold the Veterinary Medicine and Surgery Practice Act hostage in an effort to obtain concessions that would allow non-veterinarians to engage in activities that were traditionally viewed as the practice of veterinary medicine and were restricted to licensed veterinarians. The threats to professional veterinary medicine continue to grow and veterinarians must become increasingly involved in the exchange of facts and data with legislators and regulators who are responsible for establishing public policy.

ISVMA has been expended tremendous effort to build the capacity necessary to fill the information void in the legislature. The E-SOURCE Newsletter (distributed by e-mail) will keep ISVMA members informed of critical issues and timely information necessary for veterinarians to become effective advocates. We're building a database of relationships between veterinarians and elected officials. Almost every elected official either has a family veterinarian or knows a veterinarian. We've been trying to identify those relationships so we know which veterinarians can "get the ear" of any legislator. We've also worked hard to help veterinarians understand their important role in public policy.

Legislators count on us for to help them make good decisions. As ISVMA members fill that need, they will advance the well being of veterinarians, animals, the public and the environment.

"Potentially Infectious Medical Waste — A Summary of Regulatory Requirements"

Due to questions that have come through the ISVMA offices this past month, we are making available to our members information supplied through the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency. The brochure, "Potentially Infectious Medical Waste -- A Summary of Regulatory Requirements", gives an overview of the general requirements prescribing the standards and criteria for the handling of Potentially Infectious Medical Waste (PIMW). The requirements found in the Illinois Environmental Protection Act, and the Illinois Pollution Control Board's regulations, are listed in this brochure with the intent to inform to reduce the occupational and environmental health risks that occur during the storage, treatment, transport, transfer, and disposal of PIMW.

Update on ProHeart®6 INjectibale Heartworm Product for Dogs On September 21, 2004 the Veterinary Drugs Directorate (VDD), a division of Health Canada, the Canadian federal department that oversees health matters, met with representatives from Wyeth/Fort Dodge Animal Health as part of the ongoing post-market surveillance of the veterinary heartworm preventative, ProHeart 6.

Based on Health Canada's assessment at this time, an immediate recall is not warranted for ProHeart 6 in Canada. Health Canada will continue to evaluate the safety data on this product. In particular, the VDD will review American adverse experience data and complementary post-market studies.

MESSAGE FROM DEAN HERBERT WHITELEY

University of Illinois College of Veterinary Medicine

The fall semester is in full swing. In September we launched the latest iteration of the veterinary student mentoring program. A tailgate party held before an Illini football game brought together students

and ISVMA members. Mentoring provides a rewarding opportunity for you to interact with your colleagues-to-be and to contribute an important service to the College and the profession through organized veterinary medicine.

This fall also saw the launch of Veterinary Education Online—VEO, for short—our Internet-based program of continuing education any time, anywhere. VEO was designed to meet the needs of busy practitioners, especially those in small or remote practices, with little time or budget to travel for continuing education. Courses in pain management, diagnostic imaging, dentistry, ophthalmology, cytology, parasitology, and emerging diseases are immediately applicable to everyday practice issues.

After enrolling you have 60 days to complete a course from any computer with Internet connectivity, and you'll have access to experts at our College if you have questions not covered in the course materials.

Go to www.VEOillinois.org to "tour" the program and to enroll. The VEO program was funded in part by grants from the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation and U of I Online and is managed by the College's Office of Public Engagement under the leadership of Dr. Christine Merle, assistant dean.

ISVMA FORUM

Following are actual questions that have recently been asked of ISVMA staff members:

Q: Can I withhold medical records from a client that refuses to pay their bill?

A: The Veterinary Medicine and Surgery Practice Act does not include any provision that gives veterinarians a lien right that would allow them to retain the records of an animal treated by them until the owner pays the charges for that treatment. There is also nothing in the general lien acts (pertaining to other occupations and professions) that indicates that the legislature ever created such a remedy. There also doesn't seem to be any indication that there is a common law (non-statutory) veterinarian's lien. ISVMA counsel cautions any veterinarian against attempting to withhold records as security for the payment of the charges due for the treatment of the animal to which the records apply. It is also possible that the Veterinary Licensing and Disciplinary Board might view this as "unprofessional conduct" on the part of the veterinarian. It is possible that if someone were to attempt to assert such a right, some Illinois Court might well decide that there is such a common law lien. However, ISVMA legal counsel believes that the most conservative and safe approach is to avoid the exposure to a Departmental inquiry and the attendant expense and stress by returning such records upon request.

Q: Can a veterinarian fill the prescriptions issued by another veterinarian in cases where the animal is the patient of the veterinarian prescribing, and the veterinarian filling the prescription has no relationship to the animal or its owner?

A: This issue seems to be controlled by the Illinois Pharmacy Act, the relevant portions of which are:

Sec. 5. Application of Act. (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to engage in the practice of pharmacy in this State and it shall be unlawful for any employer to allow any person in his or her employ to engage in the practice of pharmacy in this State, unless such person who shall engage in the practice of pharmacy in this State shall be first authorized to do so under the provisions of this Act.

Sec. 5.5. Unlicensed practice; violation; civil penalty. (a) Any person who practices, offers to practice, attempts to practice, or holds oneself out to practice pharmacy without being licensed under this Act shall, in addition to any other penalty provided by law, pay a civil penalty to the Department in an amount not to exceed \$5,000 for each offense as determined by the Department. The civil penalty shall be assessed by the Department after a hearing is held in accordance with the provision set forth in this Act regarding the provision of a hearing for the discipline of a licensee; (b) The Department has the authority and power to investigate any and all unlicensed activity; (c) The civil penalty shall be paid within 60 days after the effective date of the order imposing the civil penalty. The order shall constitute a judgment and may be filed and execution had thereon in the same manner as any judgment from any court of record (Source: P.A. 89-474, eff. 6-18-96.); (d) "Practice of pharmacy" means the provision of pharmaceutical care to patients as determined by the pharmacist's professional judgment in the following areas, which may include but are not limited to (1) patient counseling, (2) interpretation and assisting in the monitoring of appropriate drug use and prospective drug utilization review, (3) providing information on the therapeutic values, reactions, drug interactions, side effects, uses, selection of medications and medical devices, and outcome of drug therapy, (4) participation in drug selection, drug monitoring, drug utilization review, evaluation, administration, interpretation, application of pharmacokinetic and laboratory data to design safe and effective drug regimens, (5) drug research (clinical and scientific), and (6) compounding and dispensing of drugs and medical devices. (from page 10) Sub-section (k-5) "Pharmacist" means an individual health care professional and provider currently licensed by this State to engage in the practice of pharmacy. (a) "Pharmacy" or "drugstore" means and includes every store, shop, pharmacy department, or other place where pharmaceutical care is provided by a pharmacist (1) where drugs, medicines, or poisons are dispensed, sold or offered for sale at retail, or displayed for sale at retail; or (2) where prescriptions of physicians, dentists, veterinarians, podiatrists, or therapeutically certified optometrists, within the limits of their licenses, are compounded, filled, or dispensed; or (3) which has upon it or displayed within it, or affixed to or used in connection with it, a sign bearing the word or words "Pharmacist", "Druggist", "Pharmacy", "Pharmaceutical Care", "Apothecary", "Drugstore", "Medicine Store", "Prescriptions", "Drugs", "Medicines", or any word or words of similar or like import, either in the English language or any other language; or (4) where the characteristic prescription sign (Rx) or similar design is exhibited; or (5) any store, or shop, or other place with respect to which any of the above words, objects, signs or designs are used in any advertisement.

Sec. 4. Exemptions. Nothing contained in any Section of this Act shall apply to, or in any manner interfere with: (a) the lawful practice of any physician licensed to practice medicine in all of its branches, dentist, podiatrist, veterinarian, or therapeutically or diagnostically certified optometrist within the limits of his or her license, or prevent him or her from supplying to his or her bona fide patients such drugs, medicines, or poisons as may seem to him appropriate;

ISVMA legal counsel recommends a conservative approach to this issue and argues that it is always better to avoid legal problems than to have a clever defense. Taking that same conservative approach, the Pharmacy Act does not apparently permit one veterinarian to fill the prescriptions for another, treating veterinarian. To do so would cause the veterinarian filling the prescription to fall within the definition of a "pharmacy", and would cause the other provisions of the act to apply. A veterinarian might be able to engage in the practice of filling the prescriptions for another veterinarian and never be caught, but the penalties for operating an unlicensed pharmacy are such that the risk is one that most professionals would not want to run. Absent a formal written opinion from the Department of Financial and Professional Regulation, ISVMA legal counsel recommends that Illinois veterinarians do not fill the prescriptions of other veterinarians except in circumstances as described below.

ISVMA was also asked whether the veterinarian who is being asked to fill the prescription can satisfy the requirements of the exemption provisions of the act by examining the animal in question and confirming the diagnosis and prescription of the treating veterinarian. ISVMA legal counsel believes that this idea might work, but it is strongly suggested that the veterinarian filling the prescription do more than give the animal a quick look over. In order to maximize the chances of falling within the exemption, the veterinarian being asked to fill the prescription ought to examine the animal in sufficient detail to be able to render a professional opinion that the earlier diagnosis was correct and that the drugs or medicines prescribed are appropriate. He or she may also want to actually open some sort of file that shows that this was done in the event that someone later asks to see these records.

Hawthorne Animal Hospital, Ltd.

In 1957, Dr. Merril Ottwein opened the Hawthorne Animal Hospital in Glen Carbon, Illinois and worked as a solo practitioner. Hawthorne Animal Hospital consisted of Dr. Ottwein working out of his home and providing mixed animal veterinary care.

Hawthorne Animal Hospital opened its first building in 1959 and, over the years, there were four additions to the original building. Dr. Joe Helms and Dr. Arthur Lippoldt (ISVMA Life Member) joined the practice in the early 1960s and, at the time, dairy cattle were a large part of their practice. By 1992, the St. Louis metropolitan sprawl had overrun most of the farming operations in and around Glen Carbon and Hawthorne Animal Hospital became a small animal hospital.

Dr. Philip McKinney joined Hawthorne as an associate in 1973 and eventually bought into the practice. Dr. Paul Myer joined the practice in 1989 and bought into the practice in 1997 when Dr. Helms retired. Upon Dr. Lippoldt's retirement in 2000, Dr. McKinney and Dr. Myer became the ownership partners of Hawthorne Animal Hospital, Ltd.

From its humble beginnings in Dr. Ottwein's home, Hawthorne Animal Hospital, Ltd. has grown into a very successful small animal hospital. They currently have six veterinarians in practice and employ a staff of 40 non-veterinarians. They constructed a new 12,000 square foot building in July 2003 that features 8 examination rooms, 2 surgery rooms, on-site x-ray, ultrasound, endoscopy and laboratory and upscale boarding facilities. They also operate a satellite clinic in Troy, Illinois.

Dr. McKinney and Dr. Myer provide membership as a benefit of employment for their veterinarians. Dr. Myer points to ISVMA networking opportunities as one of the greatest values of membership. ISVMA SPONSORS ANOTHER NEW MEMBER BENEFIT PROGRAM: ELECTRONIC CHECK RECOVERY

If your practice receives even one bad check per quarter, you are losing money - even if you finally collect the checks. 6. If the account is marked Account Closed or Stop Payment, the National Processing Center turns the check over to their hard collection division which begins the detailed legal procedures to pursue the check writer until the funds are recaptured for you and replaced in your account. (Because of the steep additional legal costs associated with hard collections, there is a small amount charged for this service).

Because this collection process is accomplished electronically, the recovery has little impact on your practice/client relationships. Everything is done very quickly behind the scenes and is handled as an accounting procedure. Your client will not even know that you are aware of his/her mistake because they think it is all done in the banking system and they are relieved at not being embarrassed. Your staff will no longer be responsible for making the difficult and time consuming collection calls.

Animal Medical Clinic, Ltd.

In south suburban Chicago, two veterinarians were working in separate clinics less than two miles apart. One had graduated from Iowa State University and the other from Purdue University. In a situation that could have led to intense competition, these two doctors chose a different path.
