SucroMate Equine (deslorelin acetate) - Veterinarians

(Courtesy AVMA) The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently approved SucroMate Equine (deslorelin acetate) for inducing ovulation within 48 hours of treatment in cyclic estrous mares with an ovarian follicle between 30 and 40 mm in diameter.

You may already be aware of the approval, but <u>be sure to note the statements about compounding</u> <u>in the last paragraphs of the letter</u>. FDA is cracking down on illegal compounding, so make sure you stay on the up-and-up.

(New York Times - February 7, 2011) A group of experts on human and animal maladies has developed an <u>online mapping system called Predict</u> that will let scientists monitor outbreaks of animal diseases that have the potential to spread to people. The tool will track information provided by 50,000 websites that provide information related to such outbreaks.

Human Meds Trigger Calls to Pet Poison Hotlines

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Human medications including dropped pills sickened more pets in the United States last year than any other toxin. Nearly 25% of the 168,000 calls received by the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals' hotline last year were about pets who had ingested human drugs, making 2010 the third consecutive year that such substances accounted for the primary toxin affecting U.S. pets.

FDA Announces Upcoming Shortage of Vetsulin for Dogs and Cats in the Critical Need Program

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) announced on February 4, 2011 an <u>anticipated shortage of Vetsulin</u> (porcine insulin zinc suspension), a product used to treat diabetes mellitus in dogs and cats.

About the Photo

The <u>Greater Pewee</u> (Contopus pertinax) is a passerine bird. It is a medium-sized tyrant flycatcher. Adults are dark olive on the face, upperparts and flanks. They have dull gray underparts, a large dark bill and a short tail. Birds often show a narrow, pointed crest.

Greater Pewees are regularly found from southeastern Arizona and southwestern New Mexico in the United States to central Guatemala in Central America. They have been recorded as vagrants to southern California and western and southernmost Texas. Their preferred breeding habitat are pine-oak woodlands of mountains and other upper elevations from 750-3500 meters. The female usually lays 2-4 eggs in a shallow open cup nest on a horizontal tree branch. The male defends a large area around the nesting territory. Both parents feed the young birds.

These birds are partial migrants. They retreat from northernmost breeding territories in the USA and northern Mexico for the winter.

They wait on a perch at the top of a tree and fly out to catch insects in flight.
