
Certified Veterinary Technicians (CVTS) are educated in the latest medical advances and skilled at working alongside veterinarians to give pets the best humane medical care possible.

Illinois requires CVTs to have graduated from a veterinary technology program accredited by the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) and pass the Veterinary Technician National Examination.

Illinois schools offering AVMA-accredited programs include: Joliet Junior College; Parkland College, Champaign; Rockford Career College; Southern Illinois Collegiate Common Market, Herrin; and the Vet Tech Institute at Fox College, Tinley Park.
