CE: What You Need to Know!

All educational sessions will take place at the Hilton Chicago/Oak Brook Hills Resort & Conference Center. Please note, USDA sessions and all wet labs require pre-registration.

How Many CE Hours Can I Earn?

Friday: 6 hours + 6 p.m. CE Reception = 7 hours Saturday: 6 hours + 7 a.m. CE Breakfast = 7 hours Sunday: 5 hours + CE Luncheon = 6 hours Total Convention CE Hours = 20 hours

Notes: The CE Reception, CE Breakfast, Keynote Session (2 CE Credits), CE Luncheon and the USDA Modules are included in your conference registration fee but do require pre-registration, as they are ticketed events.

If you are unclear about how much CE credit you will receive based on the sessions you plan to attend, please contact the ISVMA convention desk for assistance. It is your ethical responsibility to attend the entire session of every CE hour for which you will receive credit.

USDA Accreditation Training Courses

There are no additional fees to participate in the training, and enrollment is open to all. However, preregistration by accredited veterinarians is mandatory for training credit. On-site/walk-in registration for training credit will not be permitted. Attendance will be ticketed and tracked. The class maximum is 60.

USDA Accreditation Program Training Sessions – Part of This Year's Convention

Under the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA's) revised National Veterinary Accreditation Program, accreditation status expires every three years. As a requirement of renewal, each participating veterinarian must complete the mandated three hours or six hours of continuing education provided specifically by the USDA. The training/ educational materials can be presented live or found online. When completed at the ISVMA Convention, the participating veterinarian receives credit for completing the necessary CE for renewal of his or her accreditation status. Upon completion of each session attended, attendees will receive their certificates from the USDA representative for renewal of their accreditation status, as well as their IDFPR licensing renewal hours.

Training Sessions Being Offered Module 2: Role of Agencies (State, Federal, International) and Health Certificates This module reviews the state federal and

This module reviews the state, federal and international agencies that an accredited veterinarian may interact with and the services these agencies provide. Participants learn how to accurately complete health certificates for animals traveling domestically or internationally. Written guidelines for the completion of several USDA APHIS VS forms are provided. (Maximum capacity: 60)

Module 6: Exotic Avian Diseases

The first part of this module addresses two very important diseases of birds - avian influenza and Newcastle disease - and their potential economic impact on the U.S. economy. Clinical signs associated with these diseases and specific biosecurity measures to implement are included. In the second part of this module, veterinarians progress through an interactive scenario where one of these diseases is potentially introduced into the U.S. through the pet bird industry. Veterinarians will learn the process of reporting a possible exotic avian disease and the chain of events that occur in a foreign animal disease investigation. (Maximum capacity: 60)

Module 12: Animal Disease Traceability

This module reviews the aspects of the Animal Disease Traceability (ADT) regulation, including official identification devices and methods, required documentation for interstate movement of livestock, and the responsibilities of accredited veterinarians as these pertain to ADT. This module concludes with a scenario involving cattle movement to emphasize some important aspects of ADT. Several handouts are provided for future reference. (Maximum capacity: 60)

Students

Students attending the ISVMA Convention are welcome in any of the sessions being presented. Students may attend one ISVMA Annual Convention at no charge once during their veterinary school career. To attend at no charge, students must contact the ISVMA office, (217) 546-8381, to register. A credit card number or a check is required for students who are taking advantage of their complimentary attendance. Payment will be held and returned once the student has checked in at convention. No-shows will be charged. Students are required to pay wet lab fees.



My Approach to Respiratory Distress

Respiratory distress is a common presentation to small animal emergency practice, as well as primary care. The "fragile" nature of these patients can be intimidating to both ER and primary care veterinarians alike. Luckily, the basic approach to these patients is similar. This lecture will walk you through how to approach these patients in practice, as well as review diagnostic and therapeutic approaches to real respiratory patients in the ER.

Urinary Emergencies in Dogs and Cats

Emergencies involving the urinary tract are common in small animal practice with the potential to become life-threatening quickly. We will review common diseases in dogs and cats, including urinary obstruction, uroabdomen and traumatic injuries to the urinary tract. We will have a chance to review diagnostic approach, including bloodwork, point-of-care ultrasound, urinalysis and advanced imaging. We will also review treatment interventions in the urgent or critically ill patient, such as how to devise a fluid therapy plan, options for urinary diversion, analgesia and surgical intervention.

Wounds, Bandages and Drains

Wounds may vary among your small animal patients. One day it may be a simple laceration, and another, multiple bite wounds with evidence of necrosis and infection. Understanding the approach to wounds will assist the clinician in providing a timeline for owners for their pet's wound care and management. We will review initial wound assessment, debridement, decision for primary closure versus open wound management, different bandaging techniques and the use of drains.

Enteral Nutrition and Feeding Tube Placement

Sick or injured patients often do not eat readily in the hospital or when recovering at home. Lack of nutrition can slow healing, negatively impact a patient's immunity and even diminish a patient's overall prognosis. In this lecture, we will review the pathophysiology of malnutrition and stressed starvation, and options for assisted feeding devices to use in the critically ill patient. The attendee should come away with a general understanding of the different feeding tubes available for canine and feline patients as well as placement techniques, complications and how to devise a feeding plan for our patients, both in hospital and at home.

Blood Component Therapy and Transfusions in the Small Animal Patient There are many instances for using blood products in the emergent or critically ill small animal patient, such as hemoabdomen, immune-mediated hemolytic anemia, anticoagulant rodenticide ingestion and trauma. Often a clinician needs to devise a fluid therapy plan that includes transfusion of a specific blood product. It is important to understand the different options available for these patients and the criteria used to choose these products in practice. We will review the difference between autologous versus allogenic transfusion, and techniques for autotransfusion in the emergent patient. We will discuss administration of the different blood products, including monitoring, complications and goals for the patient.


