### Hemotology: Clinical Case Presentation and CBC Data Integration

With Federal legislation in limbo about scheduling and states enacting their own regulations on xylazine, there is no shortage of confusion and questions about what to do. This session will focus on providing an understanding of xylazine and its use as an opioid adulterant as well as what you can do to help keep your practice out of the cross hairs.

Ensuring that controlled substance operations are compliant is more important than ever for equine veterinarians. Still, how do you get there? This session is designed to provide attendees with an understanding of DEA compliance requirements as they pertain to equine medicine, the risks associated with noncompliance, and proactive ways to ensure that you and your practice are protected.

Module 4: Preventing Disease Introduction and Spread (Max capacity: 60)

This module describes key practices to prevent and minimize disease exposure to animals and humans. Information includes review of types of personal protective equipment (PPE) and levels of use, cleaning and disinfection protocols, and types of disinfectants. Instructions on reading and interpreting disinfectant labels are included. Selection and implementation of best biosecurity practices in various animal settings is presented.

### Friday, 9:00-9:50 a.m., Special Interest

Module 10: Personal Protective Equipment for Veterinarians (Max capacity: 60)

This module reviews the proper use of personal protective equipment (PPE), from basic items such as gloves and coveralls, to items providing increased levels of protection such as respirators and chemical resistant outerwear. Differences between varying levels of PPE are explained. The process for performing a risk assessment and the selection of appropriate PPE is practiced using scenarios that might be encountered during daily veterinary practice activities. PPE used during an animal health emergency response is reviewed.

Module 31: High Impact Equine Disease in the U.S. (Max capacity: 60)

This module provides accredited veterinarians with information on highimpact equine diseases that have occurred in the United States. Outbreaks of regulatory diseases that can lead to significant economic and trade impacts for the U.S. equine industry are reviewed. Principles of biosecurity to prevent and mitigate equine diseases are considered.

### Friday, 1:00-1:50 p.m., Special Interest

Module 40: The Veterinarian's Role in Preharvest Food Safety (Max capacity: 60)

The food system has many steps, including production on farms, processing, distribution, and food preparation and consumption at retail locations, in restaurants, and in homes. This farm-to-fork continuum offers opportunities to foster food safety at every step. Federal and State regulations are mainly focused on food safety at harvest and postharvest. Accredited veterinarians, working with their clients on the farm, can play a role in helping to reduce microbial load at preharvest, before the animals ever leave the farm. This module, developed through a partnership with several federal and state government agencies, and industry groups, describes how foodborne illness outbreaks are investigated, what the most common microbial pathogens of food are, and what on-farm model practices for each commodity can help reduce the microbial load and improve food safety.
